### Club Captain's "Chorus"

Our numbers have grown as our newest members join the sessions and begin their latest addiction. To everyone coming in from the lessons, welcome to our Club, you have chosen a game that will stay with you for a lifetime and we hope that you enjoy Bridge as much as we all do. Barry, Jenny, Mark and the team have done a cracker of a job and you have had the absolute best introduction from passionate people, passing on their thoughts, knowledge and the basics of a great system, ACOL. The resources used to conduct the lessons are certainly professional and being online - extremely user friendly.

NZ Bridge is tabling new suggestions to increase their contact regionally and also to assist in improving Club numbers and growing our game. The Club will be relaying this information to members once the decision to go ahead is confirmed and what method the delivery of this support will be.

Now let's talk Bridge - my thoughts this quarter lie with partner making a pass bid and the discussion around 1NT openings when holding a 5 card major Do you remind yourself what the PASS actually means - partner is giving you valuable information, explaining their hand clearly and letting you know what their hand, 95% of the time, does not hold.

They are probably saying - I do not have

- 12 HCP to open
- A long suit 6 plus or 7 plus with 6-9 HCP to open pre-emptive, weak
- 8+ HCP and a 5 plus card suit to overcall, if in that position
- A hand to encourage a bid by doubling, which some play as a balancing double, some play 10+ HCP with no 5 card suit, there are many variations

So, before you make your bid after the PASS, digest the information your partner has provided, get a picture of what partner's hand could look like and remember that your opponents will play a similar system, so you should be able to get a good idea of what your right hand opponent holds as well. I hope this tip reminds you to recall consciously what we subconsciously already know.

And lastly, should you open 1NT (12-14) with a 5-card major? There is always a lot of debate on this, many say no and lots say yes - some will do it only with a weak 5 card major.

An opening in no trumps provides a snapshot of the hand, showing both the balanced shape and limiting the points. So with a balanced hand and 12-14 HCP, in general you should do open 1NT even when you have a 5 card major. The problem with opening the major is that you can't rebid 1NT rebid (15-17 HCP) as this will promise more points than you have – it also creates an issue that if you rebid your major, its suggests you have a 6 card suit. You can avoid these problems by opening 1NT, but it is matter of choice, as often you would do better opening the major – bidding is not easy! This information comes from the Paul Marston book *The Language of Bidding* If anyone is interested in reading it, I'll make sure it is in the Library cupboard.

Finally, check out the tournament schedule – there is a feast of tournaments coming up including Congress – See you out and about!

#### Directors' Corner

New world-wide Bridge Laws came into effect on 1 August this year. Some of the changes that players need to know about are:

- The board is to remain in the centre of the table and correctly orientated - this is intended to reduce the risk of cards being returned to the incorrect pockets [and a reminder, when at a Phantom table, if you look at the cards, please be careful to replace them in the correct pockets]
- Dummy can now attempt to prevent an irregularity by any player, but cannot draw attention to one that has already occurred until play ends, except for correcting a mistaken explanation by declarer. Dummy still cannot ask if a defender has revoked.
- If a player gives an incomplete or incorrect explanation of partner's call, then the partner must call the Director before the opening lead to correct the explanation (they can call them sooner)
- A loss of concentration is not a justification to change a legal call
- Players can look at (but not show others) the card they played to the last trick until either player from their side has played to the next trick
- Players must not say there is a partnership agreement when there isn't one e.g. by stating an opinion as if it was an agreement, or by saying 'I'm taking that as...' Just say 'Undiscussed'

Finally, remember that when anything unusual happens at the bridge table call the Director, even if you think you know what the ruling is. That is what the Directors are there for!



## From Lindsay's File

How can South make 3 No Trumps with 4 spades lead from West?



## 3 NT BY SOUTH

A sure sign of the bridge expert is the sequence in which the cards are played. It should be logical, with all the precision of a mathematical progression.

Take this deal. Any departure from the order of playing the first eight tricks would bring inevitable defeat. Can you find the winning play?

#### ANSWER TO LAST NEWSLETTER'S POSER

#### How can South make 7 Hearts with a Q diamonds lead from West?

When West led Q of diamonds against South's grand slam in hearts, declarer paused to survey the dummy. Provided trumps broke evenly, South could see 13 sure winners. If West held four trumps - too bad; if East should have four trumps there was still a chance.

In no hurry to discard the spade losers, declarer took the opportunity to reduce trump length by ruffing the lead in hand with the 3 of hearts - a vital preliminary step as it turned out. Next the A and K of hearts were played, discarding a small club or spade from dummy, and the sad news was out. How nice it would have been at this stage to have a trump left in dummy to take a simple finesse and pick up East's J of hearts!

But this was wishful thinking and it was quite hopeless to play side suit winners, for then declarer would eventually have to trump and play the hearts from hand, meaning East would make the Jack. The only chance was to finesse dummy's Q of spades at the third trick. This won, so one spade was then discarded on the K of diamonds, followed by the ruff of a small diamond with the four of hearts.

Crossing to the A of spades, the last small diamond was trumped with the 6 of hearts, the A of clubs was cashed and a club led to the Q of clubs followed by the lead of dummy's A of diamonds. If East trumped, South can overtrump and make the rest of the tricks. But East followed suit and South threw the K of clubs. The 12<sup>th</sup> trick lead was a spade from dummy. East had to trump with the 9, South overtrumped with the 10 and then won the last trick with the Q of hearts, in what the theorists term a 'triple simple coup'.
