# Club Captain's Chatter

Hi everyone, how are the cards treating you?

We have some exciting club projects on the go. The radio programme – The Bridge Zone - is being really well received nationwide, the roof project is moving forward and the repair figure was escalating so the appointment of a member to resource and apply for various grants on behalf of the Club has been approved and a designated subcommittee also been established.

Earlier in the year we secured a Special Liquor License that does not require a Bar Managers License and we now actively manage the Bar as **Responsible Hosts**. As a part of this change, the locks for the Bar will be changed soon and I would like those who have key access to contact me so I can update our security register and confirm the terms of the license and changes and the date for the changeover.

Now let's talk some Bridge...

Your attitude at the table is worth match points to you.

When you arrive at a new table, compliment your partner casually on something from the previous round. If your opponents ask how you are doing, tell them positively that you are scoring well. Often opponents don't like hearing this, sometimes you hear them mutter "I don't like the sound of this". Duplicate Bridge players aren't used to hearing opponents tell them that they are happy and doing well, so *surprise* them.

Lastly, when you leave the table encourage your opponents. The better they play in all future rounds, the more it benefits you because they are playing against all your opponents sitting in the same direction. You want them to do well. You may be surprised just how far a little psychology takes you!!!

A couple of valuable tips that will increase your points and satisfaction:

Cherish your partner - if you crack a smile from time to time, you'll find everyone has a much better session.

Don't play conventions and gadgets that you don't fully understandless stress and more success is what you want.

And assess the value of every contract - it's all about scoring the biggest plus score or the smallest minus score on every hand - improve awareness of when to compete, how aggressive to be, how to judge sacrifices, when to double and when to remain quiet.

Phew - got all that... see you at the tables.

# From Lindsay's File

#### Control of the Four Suits

In the play of the dummy, the Bridge expert shows skill in a masterly control of the four suits which keeps all avenues of development open. The following hand was perfectly played and, although the adverse distribution was to some extent favourable, declarer showed flawless technique in providing for all contingencies.

## How can South make 4 Hearts with Q spades lead from West?

Against South in four hearts, West led the Q of spades. The king and ace covered and East returned a spade which South ruffed. The jack of hearts was led from the closed hand and allowed to run when West played low. East won and returned another spade. South again ruffed. At the fifth trick declarer led another heart. When West failed to follow, dummy's ace was played leaving East holding the winning trump.

To eliminate spades, declarer led the remaining spade from the table and placed a heart upon it. By counting the parcels of spades as they had appeared on the various tricks - four, three, three - all cards in that suit had now been accounted for.

Now declarer ran the diamond suit. Once again three rounds accounted for all the adverse diamonds when both opponents followed throughout. The jack of diamonds in dummy won the tenth trick. South discarded a club as did East.

Declarer now knew that East had no spades or diamonds left. East also held the king of trumps and so all East's other remaining cards must of necessity be clubs.

The last heart was therefore led from the table. Thrown in with the king, East had to return a club from the guarded king of clubs. Declarer won the last two tricks to make the game.

This sounds very simple, yet from experience I know that many players would take the club finesse and be beaten in their game when it failed.
