# Club Captains Chatter

Happy New Year to you all

As you fill up your play dates for 2018, can you spare a thought to adding 1 or 2 new partners into your calendar?

If you could add one less experienced and one more experienced person to your partnerships this year, you will find that you and our Club will be successful in growing the Game, providing support to fellow members and also increasing your own levels of play. Widening your partnerships helps deepen your Bridge knowledge and filters back to strengthening members' relationships and our Club's environment

Now let's talk defence

For declarer to succeed, there are 3 basic strategies to adopt other than winning trumps...

Ruffing losers in dummy

Establishing a long suit

Relying on finesses, endplays and defensive errors

It is our job as defenders to identify their strategy and seek to counter it

Pay careful attention during the auction because, especially if you end up defending, the very progress of the bidding may tip you off as to the likely shape of dummy and therefore to declarer's probable plan

- If dummy contains shortages which declarer may wish to take advantage of for making ruffs, lead trumps to cut down dummy's ruffing potential
- Indeed whenever declarer hesitates before pulling trumps, your thoughts should be to lead them

- If dummy contains a long establishable suit, attack the other nontrump suits aggressively, so that declarer will not have time to throw his losers away on dummy's winning tricks
- If dummy is relatively balanced, defend as safely as possible so you neither open up new suits nor provide declarer with free finesse

And just before I go - to help you put a plan in place when you arrive at a new table, announce what system you play - ACOL, weak NT etc. - then ask what the opponents play

This way you can effectively understand the communication of your opponents

The committee hope to offset some of the cost with a grant, but the first requirement of a grant application is to show that the applicant is helping themselves. The table money increase is a way we can do this.

Other improvements to the building planned for the medium term include replacing the carpet in the playing rooms, painting the men's and ladies toilets and upgrading or replacing the heating system in the O'Neill room.

# New Zealand Wide Pairs - Friday 3 November 2017



SMART END PLAY.



#### How can South make 6 Spades with K clubs lead from West?

Experienced players are well aware of the fact that an even distribution of four trumps each between declarer and dummy is an ideal one in play. Frequently this produces an extra trick than can be achieved with a five-three trump distribution. In this deal South ended up in an optimistic slam. The required play illustrates the advantage of an even trump distribution between declarer and dummy and also demonstrates an effective end play at the same time.

### How can South make 6 Spades with J diamonds lead from West?

When West led the diamond Jack, North covered and East's King forced the Ace. Provided the trumps broke there was nothing to worry about since South had only one outside loser - the 5 of diamonds. But when South cashed the Ace and King of spades, West showed out on the second round to disclose that East held the Jack covered.

Declarer set about picking up this control card. The first step was to cash the Ace of clubs, then cross to dummy with the Jack of hearts and trump a club with the four of spades. The Queen of hearts served as an entry to table for another ruff with the nine of spades. South's trump holding was now reduced to the same length as East's.

The Ace of hearts followed. When West failed to follow, declarer knew the plan had succeeded for East was placed with the remaining heart.

At the eleventh trick declarer led the losing diamond 5. West won and now led the King of clubs. East was trapped, holding the Jack and six of spades while South sat over them with the Queen and ten. Regardless of which card East chose to play, South could overtrump and take the last two tricks.
