## Meet Our Members - Nigel Gresson

(An interview by Phil Thompson)



Nigel is the perfect club member. Not only has he served on the committee for several years, but he has served as president twice: in 2017-2018, and again for 2021.

Nigel graduated in dentistry from Otago University in 1977, spent several years in the UK, before coming to Hamilton in 1990 where he practised until he retired in 2020. He first started playing bridge with

fellow dentist Ian Ross (whose story was told in a previous edition of this newsletter). Nigel, Ian, Bill West (another club member) and Patrick Carter began playing social bridge on a Tuesday night sometime early in the 21st century. At Ian's insistence, Nigel (and Ian) finally joined the club in 2008 and both have been regular (and valued) members since. Unable to just sit back and be a member, Nigel was elected to the committee in 2012, and has been part of the club's administration ever since.

Not only content to serve the Bridge Club, Nigel also served on the Waikato/Bay of Plenty dental committee, as treasurer for eight years. For many years Nigel was "Mr Parking" and organised parking at the club premises when there were events at the stadium. He did a wonderful job with his team, and we should all be very grateful for the funds he and his team brought into the club in often atrocious weather.

Nigel is a popular member of the club, and a competitive player. He was introduced to his preferred system, "Precision', about four or five years ago, and just wishes that more members would learn the system. Sometimes Nigel is like a boy who can't sit still. Quite often it is frustrating to be partnering Nigel at the club, as he seems completely unable to sit down for three minutes to quickly review the system before play starts. He always has somebody to discuss important Club business with, which is much more important than the night's results. And he will jump up to collect dirty cups for the kitchen rather than discuss the hand

which has just been played - either successfully or disastrously! But it is difficult to treat this as a failing. Perhaps more members should be concerned about keeping the playing area and the kitchen clean and tidy. Aside from bridge, Nigel's other passion is basketball. He coached basketball at Waikato Diocesan School for ten years, and he has been a loyal Breakers fan since day one. In fact, if Nigel ever contacts you to cancel a game of bridge because he is not well, just check: there is every possibility that the Breakers are playing in Auckland, or maybe even on TV. But despite the Breakers, Nigel really is a great club member, and the perfect President. As he said to me, the most satisfying part of being President is to see a room full of players at a Hamilton Bridge Club tournament. And that's what it's all about.

## Defending against the Precision 1 Club opener

find all your points the hard way.

As one of the dozen or so Precision players in our club, I'd like to offer some hints for players not accustomed to defending against the Precision system. This will mainly be of interest to daytime or Wednesday evening players.

When we open 1C, our partner is required to immediately volunteer the information "16+ points and can be any shape/distribution" (or similar wording). That is the full explanation and is all they know at that point. Sometimes we then get asked "does it show anything about clubs?" (often by people holding a long club suit). "Any shape" means just that - the opener could be holding a long club suit or no clubs at all and asking that question will not give you any more information but it will make it difficult for your partner to lead a club following your question (because by asking, then passing, you're inferring that you have an interest in that suit). Likewise, our negative response to 1C is 1D which we alert. If asked (and there's nothing wrong with asking what it means), we will volunteer "0 to 7 points any shape". Full explanation and again "any shape" tells you it says nothing about diamonds, so no need to ask any more.

Experienced tournament players have all sorts of complicated systems in their armoury to defend against the Precision 1C, but for those of you who will only come across the bid once in a while, my suggestions are:

Pass with a balanced opening hand, and don't double (as you would over a "normal" 1C opener). There is a known 16+ points in the hand that opened 1C, maybe more, you have a normal opener, how much does that leave partner? Not a lot!! Better to just sit quietly and defend and let declarer

With an unbalanced hand and a really good suit, you could decide to overcall it, including 2C, or making a weak jump (not vulnerable)! For those of you who play Michael's Cue bids, it's best to drop that against the Precision 1C opener and have the 2C available to bid a long strong club suit. Partners need to discuss this because it's not nice to bid your lovely club suit only to find partner has taken it as a Michael's Cue and bids a major that you haven't got at the 2 level when the opposition have a 16+ hand!

Because you no longer need the double as a takeout bid (and you should never overcall 1NT to play there), after a Precision 1C opener these bids are freed up for other uses. You could double to show both majors or bid 1NT to show both minors if you have good 2-suiters. This way you can find a major fit at the 1 level, or minor at the 2 level - both one level lower than over Michael's Cue or Unusual NT.

To summarise, over Precision 1C:

- . Pass balanced opening hand or of course nothing to say anyway.
- . Suit bid (including 2C) natural and good suit preferably 6-card.
- . Weak jump overcalls be careful vulnerable but worthwhile not vulnerable with a good suit.
- . Double both majors
- . 1NT both minors

This is the system of defence to the Precision 1C that Ian and I have always chosen to play. I hope this helps. Happy for any queries - email me at cynclayton@gmail.com.

## Check your member balance with Compa\$\$

Want to know how much money you have in your Compa\$\$ account? From now on, emails will only be sent to those who owe money to the club. Instead of waiting for an email to come, members can now log into their own individual Compa\$\$ account at any time to check the balance. First off, you need to set up a username and password. Information on what Compa\$\$ is and how to set up as a user is found <a href="here">here</a>. Please read the section on Compa\$\$ registration before setting up your user account. Once you have registered and logged in, a screen for Compass Scoring System will appear. Click on Compa\$\$ Accounts and your account data for the last processed period will appear on your screen. You can change to any valid Compa\$\$ date range if you want to see your transactions before the last processed period.

Credits for winning an event are only processed after the end of each month. Direct access to the Compa\$\$ information page from the club website is via the Compa\$\$ Balance link in the Results sub-menu on the front page. This is the easiest way to get to the Compa\$\$ login screen.

### Cambridge Sixes - Saturday 7 August

#### What is the Cambridge Sixes?

The Cambridge Sixes is a fun concept aimed at getting more players from each bridge grade playing in tournaments. In effect, three tournaments take place simultaneously, a 3A for the Open players, a 5B for the Intermediates and a 3B for the Juniors. It is the only Swiss Pairs event specifically for Intermediates or Juniors. The first event was held in 2013 and since then numbers have grown each year. In 2016 it was held at the new Don Rowlands Centre at Lake Karapiro for the first time. This is a wonderful venue with all mod cons along with great views out over the lake. Last year Covid saw the Sixes cancelled but it is on again in 2021 and this year the organisers have allowed for 72 tables!

What makes the Cambridge Sixes different is that entries must be made up of one pair from each grade. Open players who wish to try getting three A points must find an Intermediate pair and a Junior pair to come along with them. While there is prize money in each grade, most of the \$2000+ in prizes goes to the best performed Teams of Six when the scores get added across the grades. In 2016, a Hamilton team won the overall prize so why not have a go this year?

The day provides not only serious bridge but also a bit of fun between rounds with Trivia quizzes and prizes for the Teams judged to be wearing the most "distinctive uniform". All this for just \$36 a head.

#### What is Swiss pairs?

Swiss pairs has a scoring format which resembles teams scoring. In Swiss pairs it is the actual size of the difference in score that counts. Bidding to game is important, especially when vulnerable. But going down in a game contract is very expensive with this scoring, while making an over-trick gains very little. As declarer, it is most important to make your contract so don't take a finesse for an extra trick if there is a risk of going down. As defender, always look for a play that allows the contract to be beaten and take your chance.

### Hamilton Junior & Novice Pairs - Saturday 27 March

Eight tables of Junior players, mainly from Hamilton club but with several from Te Awamutu and Waitomo clubs, came together to play what was for many one of the first bridge tournaments they had ever competed in. Once the nerves had settled an enjoyable time was had by all. Rachelle Meijer and Stephen Weir finished a very creditable second with Heather Crosbie and Jane Sandelin in fourth place. Four pairs of novices from our club

joined in for the afternoon session, with Mary Cave-Palmer and Hugh Barton taking out the novice prize. Well done! Thanks to Michael Neels for directing the juniors and novices while also scoring both tournaments.


