A farewell for Jo and a celebration for her and our other members aged 90+ was held on a recent Tuesday afternoon.

Jo's longstanding membership has reminded many of us of the personalities and changes within the club over the years. First of all, there was a change of club rooms from the old villa in O'Neill St to architecturally designed Richmond St clubrooms. Both rooms at the present clubrooms were full. Smoking has since been eliminated, tea ladies are no longer required, heating of the Richmond Clubrooms has improved, dress standards are no longer what they were (e.g. men wearing ties). Table numbers have definitely declined and scoring has changed from manual scoring to electronic scoring. Manual scoring did create an opportunity for more socialising.

Jo's special memories of personalities are of Jewel Cresswell – a fearsome woman: Monica Heard – a big smoker: Grace Fuller – President, a big personality that filled the room: Alistair Beck – a young President whose mother was also a member of the club: Barbara Minogue – mayor of the city. # Thursday Night Teams start soon

Thursday May 15 is the start of the Elsie Pohio Intermediate & Junior Teams Championship. Any intermediate or junior players who want to play in a team, either for all 5 weeks or as a substitute, are asked to contact Helen Rinaldi before 12 May.

When you sign up to play in a Teams event at the club it is VERY IMPORTANT that you commit to play all sessions of the event. The draw is based on the number of teams and cannot be changed once the event is underway. If you are unable to play on a night for any reason you **must** find a substitute to take your place.

For many of our Junior players this will be their first experience playing teams. Some Dos and Don'ts for teams play:

DO - Bid games if they have a chance of making, particularly if you are vulnerable.

DO - Bid slams that have a chance of making

- DO -Take risks to make your contract
- DO Take risks to defeat a contract
- DO Aim for the safest slam, game or part score

DO - Be careful when sacrificing - they are bidding chancy games so may not make their contract and if they double you it could be expensive

DO - Take care dealing with pre-empts - bad breaks are likely, they may go off - remember you are aiming for a positive score.

DON'T - Double your opponents at the 3 level and give them a chance of a 'free' game bonus for an overtrick

DON'T - Make risky overcalls, especially when vulnerable - a score of -800 (3 light) is a disaster!

DON'T - Sacrifice against vulnerable games

# Car Parking helpers



# Check your member balance with Compa\$\$

Want to know how much money you have in your Compa\$\$ account? No need to wait for an email from the club. [If you are a current member and are not receiving Compa\$\$ emails from the club we have not got your correct email in our database. Please contact Julie and let her know your email]. To check your balance at any time, you can log into your individual Compa\$\$ account. First, you need to set up a username and password. Information on what Compa\$\$ is and how to set up as a user is found here. Please read the section on Compa\$\$ registration before setting up your user account. Remember to keep a record of your login settings! Once you have registered and logged in, a screen for Compass Scoring System will appear. Click on 'Check your wallet' and your account data for the last processed period will appear on your screen. You can change to any valid Compa\$\$ date range if you want to see earlier transactions. Credits for winning an event are usually processed after the end of each month. Direct access to the Compa\$\$ login page from the club website is via the Compa\$\$ Balance link in the Results sub-menu on the Home page. This is the easiest way to get to the Compa\$\$ login screen.

# Cambridge Sixes - Saturday 9 August

#### What are the Cambridge Sixes?

The Cambridge Sixes is a fun concept aimed at getting more players from each bridge grade playing in tournaments. Three tournaments take place at once, a 3A for the Open players, a 5B for the Intermediates and a 3B for the Juniors. It is the only Swiss Pairs event specifically for Intermediates or Juniors. Since 2016 it has been held at the Don Rowlands Centre at Lake Karapiro, a wonderful venue with all mod cons along with great views out over the lake.

What makes the Cambridge Sixes different is that entries must be made up of one pair from each grade. Open players who wish to try getting three A points must find an Intermediate pair and a Junior pair to come along with them. While there is prize money in each grade, most of the \$3000+ in prizes goes to the best performed Teams of Six when the scores get totalled across the grades.

The day provides not only serious bridge but also some fun between rounds with Trivia quizzes and prizes for the Teams judged to be wearing the most "distinctive team costume". This year the dress-up theme is something starting with the letter 'T'. Morning tea at 9am and a light lunch are included in the \$50 a person entry fee with bridge starting at 9.30am.

#### What is Swiss Pairs?

Swiss pairs has a scoring format which resembles teams scoring. In Swiss pairs it is the actual size of the difference in score that counts. Bidding to game is important, especially when vulnerable. But going down in a game contract is very expensive with this scoring, while making an over-trick gains very little. As declarer, it is most important to make your contract, so don't take a finesse for an extra trick if there is a risk of going down. As defender, always look for a play that allows the contract to be beaten and take your chance.
