Club Captains Chatter

Wow hasn't the year gone fast...the Club has run very successful tournaments and sessions this year and our Novice mini tournament during the Labour Weekend Congress was well received.

Thank you to Nigel and his committee, all directors, our tutors and other sub committees - fantastic effort, well done.

As we wind down for the Year, people will be looking to fill their books for 2018 - perhaps I can encourage you to reach out a little further and foster 1 or 2 new partnerships and look at playing on Wednesday nights a couple of times during the year.

I would really like to see Wednesday nights increase their table numbers; we can only do that if our members commit a month or two to these sessions. Our seniors support the Club in so many ways, it's time to return something back by lifting the player count on Wednesday nights.

Yes, the level is stronger though plenty of Intermediates and Juniors play in Restricted tournaments, Seniors boost Thursday night sessions with Restricted Teams and Monday nights, day and Summer sessions are always handicapped resulting in everyone experiencing playing at a more competitive level - this can only improve your play and what better way to do so, in your own Club environment?

If you want to give it a go, I will be only too happy to put aside some slots for you - let's make 2018 the year to spice up your Bridge play and live a little more dangerously.

Now for the quarterly chatter ...

Discards and signals

Don't you wish you knew what was in partner's hand, so you could make it difficult for the opposition to make their contracts?

When you pair up with a new partner, always ask what leads, signals and discards you are playing.

It certainly helps to know what they like and what they don't like.

There are many systems out there to show each other your preferred suit; here is an example you may like to think about:

Suit Preference Signals - source - Defence Tricks by Hy Lavinthal The concept and the principle of such suit preference signals began to be employed as early as 1933.

The principle of the suit preference method is that the player excludes the suit discarded and also the suit of the card played.

The rank of the suit preference card informs the partner which of the other two remaining suits is preferred - high card - the higher ranking of the two remaining suits and a low card - the lower ranking of the two remaining suits.

Here's an example:

North - South are playing 3NT with South as declarer.

West leads the \clubsuit Jack, and the first trick is won in the dummy with the \clubsuit Queen. East has no clubs, so discards the \spadesuit 3. This is a low card in the Diamond suit, meaning West should lead the lower of the two other suits, which is Hearts. Spades would be the higher suit.

The next time West wins a trick, following the principle of suit preference signals, West leads a Heart allowing the contract to be defeated via the Lavinthal Signal Method.

Without this suit preference signal the defenders would have to guess which Major suit to play.

Grab a book and find out something new - there are plenty of resources in the Club Library to rev up your game.

Oh, and one last piece of advice, your partner needs to read the book as well so together you can discuss, learn and develop what system works best for you both.

Defeat that contract!

SUMMER BRIDGE

Note the dates for some Tuesday nights in the current (2017) bridge book are wrong - see below for the correct dates.

Hamilton club runs Summer Bridge 3 times a week (Tuesday, Thursday and Friday) in the months of December and January except for the Christmas and New Year holiday weeks.

Summer Bridge is open to ALL grades and ALL players (members of all bridge clubs). On Thursday nights and Friday mornings you will need to have organised your own partner, but on Tuesday nights you can just turn up and the Club will find you a partner on the night - please be there before 7.15 if you need a partner. Table money of \$4 applies. Summer Bridge is stand-alone scratch, with NS and EW winners each night given a voucher for a free session of bridge at Hamilton.

Waikato/Bays Regional Pairs and Hamilton Junior Pairs - Saturday 9 September

The regional pairs was a very popular and highly contested tournament, with a record 46 pairs of Open players including current Grandmasters and former New Zealand representatives. The play was a Swiss pairs format with pairs playing a total 72 boards in 9 rounds of 8 boards at a time, moving up and down the "pecking order" according to each result. 

How can South make 6 Spades with J diamonds lead from West?

When trumps break badly, it is possible at times to pick up defenders' winners by means of a reduction play. After the bad break was discovered on the second round of trumps, declarer needed a trump coup, along with being lucky enough to discover the side suits favourably distributed.

ANSWER TO LAST NEWSLETTER'S POSER



How can South make 3 No Trumps with 4 spades lead from West?

West led the 4 of spades against South's game effort (in both senses of the phrase!). When East played the Jack, declarer had to win with the Queen. Otherwise a spade continuation from East would be disastrous.

Declarer could not afford to use the only entry to dummy at the second trick. Instead a small diamond was led from hand, which East won with the nine.

It would not help the defenders at this stage to make their club winners.

The time had come to venture at this stage, and East found the best return - another spade. Declarer won with the Ace.

At the fourth trick South crossed to the dummy with the Queen of hearts, then played the Ace and King of hearts, discarding a small spade and club.

Dummy's remaining diamond was led at the seventh trick and the Queen was successfully finessed.

The Ace of diamonds dropped the opponents' remaining two diamonds together. This left declarer with two winning diamonds, sufficient to ensure game.

No doubt the result was lucky, but declarer did play faultlessly. The defence had no chance of beating the contract as the cards lay and were played, but any slip on South's part would have made defeat a very elementary process.
