The rule of thumb is:

Before you know you have a trump fit with partner

Add 1 point for a doubleton 2 points for a singleton And 3 points for a void

When you know you have a trump fit

Add 1 point for a doubleton 3 points for a singleton And 5 points for a void The saying that my hand improves during the auction is true - you can find more points as the bidding goes on. It may help you decide whether to keep bidding - your fingers and toes come in handy when counting points. Sometimes you need to use all your digits to decide whether to pass, compete or bid game. I don't always know what's right - sometimes you get a feel, most times it's logical and sometimes you just shut your eyes and bid. I may even submit my own contribution of quirky bids called... 'On the smell of an oily rag - invites are always game force'. See you at the tables...

Meet Our Members - Richard Hooper

(Interview with Phil Thompson)

Richard is a long-standing member of our club, having joined over 30 years ago, in 1988. But his bridge playing began much earlier, in 1965 at Te Awamutu College where Paul Hobbs was a mathematics teacher, a Bridge Grand Master and a NZ Representative. Paul coached some lunchtime bridge which was popular when the weather did not favour kicking a ball around outside. When Richard and Julie joined the club



they took lessons again, this time taught by Malcolm Smith. During the period from 2000 to 2017, Richard progressed from Provincial Master to Life Master (his current rank), and his regular partner was the late Rodney Harris. He and Rodney played a very basic Acol system, with few special bids, but with considerable success nevertheless.

Richard attended Waikato University and graduated in Management and Marketing. During his University years he started his lawn-mowing business to fund his study years. It was so successful that he has continued that business right to the present day, apart from a break in 1980 when he travelled to Rotterdam to propose to Julie, who was working there at the time. He worked as a glass-washer (read window-cleaner), a vital trade in a windy city by the water. His trip was not in vain, and Richard and Julie were married in 1986. They have two sons, two daughters and 5 grand-children.

Richard has been a long-standing servant of our club, serving on the committee 1993-1995, and again 2001-2005, including as President 2004-2005. He served on the Match Committee from 2002 to 2015 and has also served on the Waikato Bays Region committee as President in 2005-2006. During his time on the committee, Richard has seen and been responsible for some major milestones and changes. He was instrumental in setting up the Waikato Area Pairs (WAP), based on a similar Bay of Plenty competition, and he was also instrumental in getting our Wednesday night 3A Swiss Pairs approved by NZCBA (now NZ Bridge). But one of the most important changes was to initiate, share, and support Jan Spaans' vision to introduce electronic scoring into NZ via the Hamilton Club, which became the first club in New Zealand to go digital. He always believed that streaming data was a gateway to the future. His dream of playing interclub online at the Club via the internet became a reality, using cameras and a video link. Although the initial event was short-lived, those early experiments with simultaneous bridge paved the way for X-club bridge, where clubs throughout the country play the same hands and results can be computed for a couple of hundred pairs, rather than 20 or 30 at a single club. This technology also enables the result for the NZ Wide Pairs in November to be available shortly after the conclusion of play, rather than a few weeks later as it was prior to electronic scoring.

Richard told me that his finance committee chair did some analysis and determined that providing biscuits at supper time was costing the club \$3000 per annum, so during his presidency the committee cancelled the tea lady and the free biscuits and reverted to a self-service tea and coffee facility. This was apparently not very well received by the membership at the time but seems to be happily accepted these days.

One final improvement was when the stadium was built, and the committee determined that there was a financial opportunity to offer car parking for a fee. Richard and his committee did a search of the title for the property and determined that the rear fence was well inside the boundary. After checking with the City Council, a working bee was held to move the fence back to the boundary. This provided a much larger parking space, which has proved to be a necessity when the club runs big tournaments, and a great source of income when there are events at the stadium.

JP Available

Club member Lucie Armstrong is a Justice of the Peace. New Gold Grandmaster

Kathy Yule of Matamata, who joined our club this year, became a Gold Grandmaster in October. Congratulations on reaching this elevated level – only 3 players in New Zealand have a higher grade.



NZ Bridge National Congress Results

Over 700 players including 70 from Australia arrived in Hamilton at the start of October to take part in the NZ Bridge Congress held at the Distinction Hotel in Te Rapa. Over 9 days of serious competition players need to overcome exhaustion and bidding misunderstandings. These Hamilton club members scored in the top 10 in their events (top 5 for Novices & Juniors, top 20 for premier events), an impressive result given the very high calibre of competition:


